
The Showquest students have also been practising very hard and are preparing for the regional Show Quest on May 1st (the first week of Term Two).

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Heights Course

From the Board

From time to time, you may have an issue that needs to be discussed further in order to resolve it.

We would encourage you to view our policies directly, as you are able to click on other helpful links within the policies also. The policies are on the website schooldocs.co.nz. From there you just type 'dargaville high school', then it takes you to the user name and password, which are both the same, lower case "darghigh".

Please see below a piece from the policy that explains the process:

Concerns and complaints can be raised verbally or in writing. If a concern or complaint raised verbally cannot be resolved through discussion, the person who receives the information may make a written record of the discussion or ask that the concern or complaint be received in writing.

* Anyone who has a concern or complaint should raise it as soon as possible with an appropriate person at the kura. This is usually with a staff member who is directly involved (e.g. classroom kaiako, kaiako in charge of a programme). The person who receives the concern or complaint may refer the matter to a more appropriate staff member, which may include senior staff, the tumuaki, or the board.

* Serious matters can be raised directly with the tumuaki, who may escalate the matter to the board as required.

* A concern or complaint about the tumuaki should be raised with the presiding member.

* A concern or complaint about the presiding member should be raised with another board member.

If a person feels their concern or complaint has not been resolved after receiving a response, they may escalate the matter to the tumuaki or board.

In case you are unfamiliar with some of the words used, please see the following chart:

* presiding member - previously known as the board chair

* kaiako - teacher

* tumuaki - principal

It is important to remember that all staff are approachable and happy to assist or redirect you to the person who can best help you.
